COMS 624

INTERCULTURAL COMMUNICATION

COURSE DESCRIPTION

Analysis of theories and research of communication between people from various generational, racial, ethnic, regional, and international cultures.

RATIONALE

This course provides an overview of both cross-cultural communication (the study of how communication practices vary among cultures) and intercultural communication (the study of variables and barriers affecting communication between individuals from different cultures).

- B. Identify and analyze specific aspects of culture and integrate the study of intercultural communication with a Christian worldview.
- C. Explain how cultural variables affect intercultural communication and articulate ways to overcome barriers to effective intercultural communication.
- D. Demonstrate written and oral communication skills on a graduate level.

After reading the Course Syllabus and <u>Student Expectations</u>, the student will complete the related checklist found in Module/Week 1.

C. Discussion Board Forums (2)

Discussion boards are collaborative learning experiences. Therefore, the student is required to create a thread in response to the provided prompt for each forum. Each thread must be at least 400 words, demonstrate course-related knowledge, and include at least 3 citations in current APA format. In addition to the thread, the student is required to reply to 2 other classmates' threads. Each reply must be at least 250 words.

D. Worldview Survey

The student will read the first chapter of *The Universe Next Door* (provided in PDF format) and answer the Seven Basic Questions at the end of the chapter.

E. Common Thread Essay

The student will write an essay of at least 1,000 words in current APA format that focuses on identifying the shared or common thread(s) between himself/herself and 1 of the authors of the assigned readings. The student will pay special attention to how the author has invited growth in his/her life. The paper must include at least 5 references from the course readings, the Bible, and pertinent outside sources.

F. Cultural Interaction Preparation

The student will submit a 1-page summary in current APA format of what he/she is hoping to accomplish by completing the Cultural Interaction Conversation. This summary will also include whom the student plans to interview as well as what topics may be covered. The student must also submit a signed statement from the interviewee giving permission to be consulted for the project. Although outside sources are not required, any sources used must be correctly cited.

G. Cultural Interaction Conversation

The student will spend 3–4 hours with an individual from a culture other than his/her own. The student must investigate the culture and formulate questions to pose to the individual as part of his/her preparation for the actual meeting. The student will then submit a 3–4-page reflection paper in current APA format.

H. Group Book Project

The student will be placed in a group to read and critique a book (from the recommended resources list) that depicts intercultural communication and/or cross-cultural variability in communication. This project will be completed in 2 parts. The assignment must adhere to current APA format.

I. Cultural Interaction Preparation

The student will submit a 1-page summary in current APA format of what he/she is hoping to accomplish by completing the Cultural Interaction Conversation. This summary will also include whom the student plans to interview as well as what topics may be covered. The student must also submit a signed statement from the interviewee giving permission to be consulted for the project. Although outside sources are not required, any sources used must be correctly cited.
