INTRODUCTION TO CHURCH PLANTING

COURSE DESCRIPTION

An introduction to the skills and knowledge needed to plant a New Testament church "in culture." A survey is given of the various schools of church planting with an evaluation of their strengths and weaknesses. (Formerly EVAN 550)

RATIONALE

The Great Commission requires followers of Christ to make disciples. There are many occasions in which there are not local churches to begin and continue the disciple-making process. Therefore, church planting is an essential activity requiring called and equipped leadership. This course will expose students to the biblical foundation of the local church, the need for new churches, current church models, and the practical aspects of a contextualized ministry. All assignments will deal with principles, practices, and processes involved in providing church planting leadership.

Upon successful completion of this course, the student will be able to:

- A. Demonstrate the theological foundations and necessity of church planting.
- B. Identify the six major church planting strategies.
- C. Analyze the church planting field.
- D. Evaluate the major church planting strategies.
- E. Construct a church planning strategy proposal for a specific community.

After reading the Syllabus and <u>Student Expectations</u>, the student will complete the related checklist found in Module/Week 1.

C. Discussion Board Forums (3)

The student is required to provide a thread in response to the provided topic for each forum. Each thread must be at least 400 words, have assertions supported with 3 citations in parenthetical format, and demonstrate course-related knowledge. In addition to the thread, the student is required to reply to 2 other classmates' threads. Each reply must be at least 250 words with assertions supported with at least 1 source. (Outcomes: A, B, D)

D. Initial Essay

The student will write a 2–3-page essay describing his/her experience in secular employment, experience in ministry, exposure to and experience in church planting, and long term ministry goals. (Outcomes: A, B, D, E)

E. Book Critiques (3)

The student will complete 3 book critiques based on assigned readings for the course. The paper must comply with current Turabian writing style and be 6–8 pages in length. Each Book Critique must be submitted through SafeAssign. (Outcomes: A, B, C, E)

F. Church Planting Project: Community Exegesis

The student will submit a 4–6-page paper exegeting a community in which the student intends to plant a church. The student will use course readings, census materials, and other resources to present the church planting context. This assignment will build toward the Church Planting Project: Final Submission. (Outcomes: C, E)

G. Church Planting Project: Model Development

The student will write a 4–6-page paper articulating the major church models, or elements thereof, to which the student proposes. The Community Exegesis assignment will contextualize the corporate service and the resources to facilitate those services to be covered. This assignment will build toward the Church Planting Project: Final Submission. (Outcomes: C, E)

H. Church Planting Project: Final Submission

The student will submit a 4–6-page paper presenting the strategy and the associated landmarks for the Church Planting Project. This paper will be the culmination of the Church Planting Project: Community Exegesis and the Church Planting Project: Model Development. (Outcomes: B, C, D, E)
