COURSE SYLLABUS

HIUS 530

AMERICAN CHRISTIAN HERITAGE

COURSE DESCRIPTION

The course will explore American Christianity, emphasize its impact on American political, social, and cultural history, and evaluate the role of Christianity in influencing the American character.

RATIONALE

The course charts the development of American Christianity, emphasizes the American evangelical tradition, and shows the impact of Christianity on American history, culture, and politics. The course emphasizes biblical worldview themes and is an important and unique component of the M.A. in History program. The course serves students who are particularly interested in Christian themes of history, and it satisfies a graduation requirement of the program.

- A. Identify major figures and events in American Christian history.
- B. Describe periods of development of American Christian heritage.
- C. Explain the impact of American Christianity on political, religious, and cultural systems.
- D. Evaluate interpretative and historiographical approaches in American religious history.
- E. Apply biblical principles to the problems and issues of American religious history.
- F. Demonstrate graduate-level competence in research, writing, and documentary analysis.

B. Course Requirements Checklist

After reading the Syllabus and <u>Student Expectations</u>, the student will complete the related checklist found in Module/Week 1.

C. Discussion Board Forums (4)

The student will create a thread in response to the provided topic for each forum. Each thread must be 3–5 minutes in video format and demonstrate course-related knowledge. In addition to the thread, for each forum the student will reply in written format to at least 3 classmates' threads. Each reply must be at least 100 words.

D. Short Paper

The student will write a 3-page research-oriented paper in current Turabian format that focuses on assigned sources of topic. (See Directions.) The paper must include at least 5 scholarly or primary references in addition to the course textbooks and the Bible.

E. Research Prospectus

The student will write a 2-3 page prospectus for his or her Research. The prospectus topic must be approved by the instructor and must include at least 5 scholarly or primary sources in addition to the course textbooks and the Bible. The prospectus must include a separate bibliography in Turabian format.

F. Annotated Bibliography

The student will compile an annotated bibliography for his or her Research Project and Discussion assignment. The Bibliography must begin with a one paragraph project overview including an anticipated thesis statement or working hypothesis. This bibliography must include at least 10 scholarly, primary, or web-based sources in addition to the course textbooks and the Bible, with a 200–250-word annotation for each source, in current Turabian format.

G. Research Project and Discussion

The student will write a 15-page research-oriented paper in current Turabian format that focuses on any instructor-approved topic covered by the course. The paper must include at least 15 scholarly, primary references in addition to the course textbooks and the Bible. This project may be submitted in another format, such as a PowerPoint or video. PowerPoint projects must contain at least 15 slides and videos must be at least 10 minutes. All projects must demonstrate graduate standards of research methodology, historical analysis, and documentary citation.

H. Preliminary Quiz

In order to gauge the student's current knowledge of American Christian heritage, he or she will take a preliminary quiz that contains 40 multiple-choice questions. The quiz will have a time limit of 30 minutes.

I. Textbook Quizzes (7)

The student will take quizzes on the assigned textbook reading in the Reading & Study folder for each module/week. Each quiz will be open-book/open-notes, contain 10 multiple-choice questions and 1 essay question, and have a time limit of 30 minutes.

J. Reading Quizzes (7)

The student will take quizzes on the assigned articles and websites in the Reading & Study folder for each module/week. Each quiz will be open-book/open-notes, contain 10 multiple-choice questions and 1 essay question, and have a time limit of 30 minutes.

K. Presentation Quizzes (7)

The student will take quizzes on the assigned presentations and videos in the Reading & Study folder for each module/week. Each quiz will be open-book/open-notes, contain 10 multiple-choice questions and 1 essay question, and have a time limit of 30 minutes.

C. Quizzes
