COURSE SYLLABUS

PLCY 850 Introduction to Social Policy

COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course requires students to research the basic contours of their chosen polcy concentration. Students will work with their faculty member to understand the scope, history, controversial issues, and key policy outcomes associated with this concentration area. This will research will serve as a stepping stone to conducing a comprehensive literature review for their dissertation, and provide the needed context ensure that the students' chosen dissertation topics are focused and appropriate.

This course is a necessary first step in the research required for the dissertation process.

Discussion Board Forums (8)

Discussion boards are collaborative learning experiences. Therefore, the student is required to provide a thread in response to the provided prompt for each forum. Each thread must be 750-1,000 words and demonstrate course-related knowledge. In addition to the thread, the student is required to reply to 2 other classmates' threads. Each reply must be 400-500 words. Each thread and reply must utilize at least 3 scholarly sources (7–8 for the threads for forums 4 and 5).

Annotated Bibliographies (5)

The student will choose at least 8–10 peer-reviewed articles regarding a specific policy in the module's readings. The student will then summarize each article in 150-300 words (for a total of 1200-3000 words). All citations must conform to current Turabian formatting. These assignments will comprise a synthesis of current topics in social policy.
