COURSE SYLLABUS

THEO 605

THEOLOGY FOR GLOBAL ENGAGEMENT

COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course explores a biblical foundation and theology for Christian mission. Beginning with a rigorous interaction with the Old and New Testaments, the key aspects of mission theology will be explored as well as how theology of mission relates to other key themes in theology. The seminar will also consider how theology of mission affects mission practice.

RATIONALE

Rapidly globalizing networks, colliding civilizations, multiplying religious and ideological pluralisms, ongoing explosion of Christian adherents in the non-Western world, and a myriad of other dynamic influences converge to raise daunting issues and pose critical questions to those who wish to glorify God among the nations and be obedient to Christ's Great Commission in the 21st century. Today it is perhaps less important to decipher what needs to change than it is what must remain the same. The Word of God provides certain truths for understanding and assessing the challenges before us. This course burrows back into biblical and theological moorings of God's plan for the ages, lets the Bible speak afresh to key issues in theology, determines fresh ways to address these issues, and suggests practical ways beyond the impasse.

C. Discussion Board Forums (7)

There will be 7 Discussion Board Forums throughout this course. The student is required to provide a thread in response to the provided topic for each forum. Each thread is to be a minimum of 400 words in length and demonstrate course-related knowledge. In addition to the thread, the student is required to provide 2 replies. In your replies, state areas of agreement and disagreement with the thread using the textbooks and/or research to support your claims. Each reply must be a minimum of 200 words.

D. Case Study Project

The student will write a 10–12-page, analytical case study which isolates typical cultural/theological issues in global settings, uses a biblical analytical grid for evaluation, and determines a "way forward" role-playing as the cross-cultural agent in said context. The case study will be in current Turabian format with all sources properly documented. The project must include at least 10 references in addition to the course textbooks and the Bible.

E. Reading Quizzes (4)

Each Reading Quiz will cover the Reading & Study material for the module/week in which it is assigned. The first 3 Reading Quizzes will be open-book/open-notes, contain 15 multiple-choice questions, and have a 1-hour time limit. The final Reading Quiz will be open-book/open-notes, contain 4 short essay questions, and have a 1-hour time limit.
